



Korean Christian Church in Japan

History:

The Korean Christian Church in Japan traces its history back to 1908, when Korean students in the Tokyo area began worshipping together. In 1912, Korean Presbyterian and Methodist churches combined their efforts to work together for mission among Koreans in Japan. The ecumenical character of the KCCJ today reflects this early history. In 1945 the church became autonomous.

Activities:

As a minority church, the KCCJ has been involved in human-rights activities with a primary focus on the situation of Koreans in Japan. Its commitment to human rights and social issues began in 1968 and the church has regarded these activities as its God-given mission within the Japanese and global society. In recent times, the KCCJ has been actively involved in the movement for enacting the proposed legislation to preserve the human rights of foreign residents in Japan.
